Overview

Geography is not only up-to-date and relevant, it is one of the most exciting, adventurous and valuable subjects to study today. Careers in Geography help not only establish environmental issues, but also solve them. An A Level in Geography is recognised for its academic 'robustness' and, most importantly, it also helps young people into the world of work. Employers prize the knowledge and skills that studying Geography can provide, be it knowing how the world works, planning research and report writing, working in a team, using new technologies and communication skills – and much more.

KS3

In Geography at Key Stage 3 we follow the National Curriculum for Wales developing thinking, communication, ICT and number skills. Geography develops and stimulates learners' interest and fosters a sense of wonder about the variety of places and the complexity of the world through a variety of topics such as the Tropical Rainforest, What is happening to our World and The Almighty Dollar.

KS4

Geography at KS4 follows the WJEC Geography Specification covering Changing Human and Physical Landscapes (40% of GCSE) and Environmental and Development Issues (40% of GCSE) looking at a variety of interesting and relevant topics as well as a fieldwork component (NEA 20%).

KS5

Geography at KS5 follows the WJEC Geography Specification. Changing Landscapes (24% of A Level), Changing Places (24% of A Level), Global Systems (24% of A Level) and Global Governance (24% of A Level) and fieldwork enquiry (20% of A level) are all studied over 2 years.
